Dear Madam,

I have received your letter of April 5 with the enclosed manuscript which now seems very satisfactory.

With regard to your remark on page 1 : I note that you have inserted the name of A. Newton. I have looked up the article of Mr. Newton in Ibis, Vol. I, 1865, New Series, p. 216, from which it is clear that Newton and Birkbeck travelled together, but on that particular trip when the King Karl Land was sighted Birkbeck was alone with his division of the party. Thus Newton never saw the islands. It would thus be better to leave his name out, although he is the author of the report of the matter. Perhaps there might be inserted a reference to the article in the Ibis (Notes on the Birds of Spitsbergen, Ibis, Vol. I, 1865, New Series, pp. 199-219, 496-525.).

On page 2 I have altered Department to Service which is a more correct translation. *Schultz, should read Schulz*

On page 3 Department has been changed to Ministry to prevent misunderstandings, although the former word, of course, is quite correct. Further down, the sentence in brackets should read: The Norwegian sea-mile of 4 nautical miles. It is the old Norwegian land mile which was 11,2 km or 7 English statute miles. The modern Norwegian land mile is reckoned at 10 km.

On page 2, I forgot to say, geologist should read zoologist.

On page 5, line 3 from below, (Norwegian) is unnecessary and should be left out. On the following line: three geographical miles = 22.2 kilometres, and not 29.

The note for "Contributors" might read as follows:

Adolf Hoel is director of the Norwegian Institute for the Scientific exploration of Svalbard and the Arctic Sea (Norges Svalbard- and Ishaforskningsinstitutt), and is also a reader of geology at the University of Oslo. Since 1908 he has been the leader of many Norwegian scientific expeditions to Svalbard and East-Greenland, and has published a number of papers on the geology and geography of those regions.

With regard to separate prints I shall want 500 in cover.
